

With all the above in mind, and following comments received by the committee, the following points are brought to members attention:

- Motorbikes, please, to be ridden only as transport, to and from the club and not ridden on site.
- The incineration of rubbish in our burner to be limited to club kitchen/small quantities of paper waste only and burning to take place in the evening only. (Logs, household rubbish and gas canisters etc... are not included!)
- All locomotives should be moved manually on & off the traverser and not under their own power, as this is far safer.
- All drivers are once again reminded to maintain a "steady pace" in passenger service. Young or old, if you are asked to "ease up a bit" by the TC or Ops Managers, please take it in good spirit and comply.

On a lighter note, many congratulations to Allan Killick on completing 50 years active service at the club! We thank him for all his hard work and especially for keeping our signalling system operating for half a century! A great achievement, and we hope he will be able to contribute for many years to come!

So far, too, this year, the weather has been kind to us, and the Station Masters are doing a good job with the fares!
