

Chairman's Notes

With our AGM approaching rapidly and winter beginning to fade out, it is time to start thinking about the new running season 2019. The running book has already been made up and our operations managers invite you to sign up for duties. The main running begins Easter weekend (4 days).

I have been asked by the Committee and Operations department to remind and update you about a few matters regarding the coming season and passenger working:-

If you are running a 'steamer', please check your boiler certificate validity and if necessary book in a boiler test in good time with one of our boiler inspectors. If you are requiring a hydraulic test, I would remind you, it's up to you to prepare all the necessary bungs and connections to enable the inspector to do the test. Please DO NOT expect the boiler inspector to do this.

Following comments made last year, John B has made modifications to the speed signal at the back of the clubhouse. This now has 2 white lenses (instead of the yellows) and if you are travelling at walking pace they will remain unlit. If you are travelling too fast, they will flash and sound the alarm buzzer in the clubhouse. Please keep your speed down here so as not to trigger the signal. It is for safety reasons. The section triggering the signal has also been extended a little nearer to the signal and point, in line with member's suggestions.

John B has produced a new risk assessment concerning our steaming bay area. Following comments and dangerous situations last year, we need to keep members of the public, especially young children, out of the steaming bay compound when we are operating the railway. Extra signs are available this year, along with a couple of light chain barriers. If a member(s) of the public enter, please ask them (politely) to wait / stand / observe from behind the railings / chains. For steam drivers, please take care when cleaning down, not to blow hot ash, hot water or soot towards anyone.

Lastly, as always please, drive at a moderate pace with passengers and be especially careful through the cuttings and tunnels, and within the park where children or the public are walking (or playing) close to the line side. We enjoy an open park with no fencing around the railway, so let's keep it that way please.

Over the winter, maintenance work has taken place on the track and to the trucks, along with the building of a new 3 car set of carriages. The new trucks may not be ready for the start of the season but should be operational later this year. All the usual gardening and leaf clearance has continued throughout. We also held a fireworks night, winter lights festival, a New Year's Day get together and exhibited at Alexandra Palace. I would like to thank everyone for all the hard work over the last 5 months.

I wish you a good start to the coming running season.

Alexandra Palace

Hot on the heels of our New Year's Day event, the Alexandra Palace Show normally follows just a couple of weeks later with preparations already underway before Christmas. For 2019 we had another good mix of models and a different layout due to the withdrawal of the Northern Association stand in its own right. This meant for the first year ever our stand had a 360 degree view with no option for backing boards. Despite initial misgivings at this revised layout it actually worked well but meant that seating for those manning the stand was very limited. This year we took the following items for display: 5" BR '9F', 5" BR 'Standard 4', 5" LMS 'Jinty', 5" 'Dougal', 5" Oil / Petrol Tankers (2 off), 5" Guards Van, other 5" Wagons (4 off), 5" 'Pump Trolley', 3 ½" 'Pullman Coach', 2 ½" GWR 'Grange', Test Boiler + Fittings and Hydraulic Test Pump – a nice overall selection.

The Thursday (set up) dawned bright but with showers looming and a cold northerly breeze! I picked up the van early that morning and was lucky to be trusted to look after a basically new '68 plate' Ford Transit with barely more than delivery miles on the clock! I then met Adam, Alex, Mike W & Nick at the club to load up. After the usual head scratching and re-packing we got everything in, nice and tight, and ready for the 90-odd mile drive round the motorway and dreaded North Circular! Keeping to within an inch of the speed limits and a near perfect run we made the exhibition hall in 1h 45m, a near record! Unloading was easy and by 15:00 we were done and dusted with our stand set for the 3 days.

Friday, I met Alex, Mike W & Nick for the journey by train to London and then we joined Adam & John B at Alexandra Palace. After a breakfast we were set for the day ahead and another busy one it was. Despite a slow start the hall filled quickly and we were kept on our toes talking to friends, as well as strangers. All of the exhibits created interest and with a good size crew we had time to engage with visitors as well as spend time looking around the show ourselves.

The Saturday crew consisted of Andrew S, John B, Ken, Norman, Sam's H & R, and me. Equal or perhaps a little busier than Friday, Saturday was another very good day and it was hard to get a break from the stand! Likewise though, we welcomed some familiar faces as well as many passers-by too. Again we had time to engage with all of our visitors, including spending time with people new to the hobby who were seeking advice on many aspects of model engineering.

Sunday, and we were back to Adam, Alex, Fraser, Nick & I, and later joined by Andrew S. Assuming an under-40 is considered 'young', even if relatively, I am proud to say that our Sunday crew was entirely 'younger' members. How many clubs can boast this, let alone manning an exhibition stand? Although a bit quieter, Sunday was still very steady and soon enough it was nearly 16:00 and time for breakdown to commence. After a fairly speedy exit, we were on the road before 18:00 and back by 20:30, including a trip via John B's in Caterham, which did not go entirely to plan and the detail of which shall be consigned to history! Having unloaded I finally dropped off the van (still in one piece) about 21:00 and time for home. Thanks to all those who contributed to a very successful weekend. It was as ever very worthwhile; if hard work at times and well done to Adam, Andrew S & Nick for their mentions and picture in the latest EiM. Here's to 2020...

Footpath Work



From The Workshop - Mike W

Over the last few weeks I have noticed a serious deterioration in the state of the files that are hung on the wall in the main workshop. The rat tail file has had its end broken off and what remains is bent (picture below left). The flat file is seriously worn from bad use (picture below right). These files are relatively new which can only mean that we have people that do not know how to use them, or far worse are deliberately misusing the files.

Keeping and leaving the file teeth clear of debris is a very simple process and should always be done when you have finished using the file. We do have file card brushes available (**pictures below left & right**) and for the more stubborn chips you can use a piece copper or also thin aluminium plate (**picture bottom**). Using the copper or aluminium, push it across the file in the direction of the teeth cut lines and this will remove stubborn chips. I have just purchased new files and I will put them out soon. I do not purchase cheap files as I am fully aware the quality of the file is important for longevity, so please look after this set and ensure that you only use them for their intended purpose.





For Sale - 5" Gauge 'Model Works' 'Black 5'

After many trials and tribulations, I have now decided to sell my 'Model Works' 'Black 5'. The locomotive has been transformed from the original kit and is now fully operational. 

Work in Progress - 'Royal Scot' & Wagons

Following their successful run on New Year's Day, the two oil / petrol tankers were hastily cleaned up and prepared for display at the Alexandra Palace Show back in January. I had hoped to fit the brake gear in time for Ally Pally but a couple of minor setbacks meant this was not possible and I was not prepared to rush the final pieces for the sake of it. Nevertheless, and even without the brake gear fitted, there were some very positive comments at the Show but no firm offers of intent! I am not sure I could contemplate selling either with all the work that has gone into them! Since Ally Pally, the remaining brake gear components have been fabricated and are now being trial fitted. I said in my last article that 'the little things in life matter and when it comes to model engineering they often take the most time', and the brake gear is of no exception! Of course when you make more than one model at a time, the multiples of components add up too!

Picture below: The ensemble of brake parts and when you consider the actuation / pivot bars = 1 hour each, the pivot blocks = 1 hour each and finally the fitted pins = 30 minutes each, it is not hard to see where the hours go! I hope the effort is worth it when these are assembled during the coming couple of weeks!
